

Obituary Dr. Clarence John Bibby


Clarence was born, September 27, 1954 in Atlantic City, New Jersey, the oldest child of Clarence and Edna (Loving) Bibby. Making education a priority throughout his life, Clarence graduated from Holy Spirit High School in Atlantic City before earning his bachelor's degree from Seton Hall University, South Orange, New Jersey in 1977. Clarence subsequently received a Master's Degree in Psychology from Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri in 1987 and went on to complete his doctorate in Educational Psychology from The University of Texas at Austin in 1988.

While at the University of Texas, Clarence met his future wife Michele. On June 22, 1985 Clarence married the former Michele Yvette Alexander in Houston, Texas and to this union came two beloved children, Julian and Jordan.


Clarence served as the Director of the Upward Bound Program from 1985 through 1988 at Huston-Tillotson College. After receiving his Doctorate, Dr. Bibby served as the Vice President of Student Affairs at Huston-Tillotson College from 1988 until 1990. Dr. Bibby continued his public service work and began working for the City of Austin in 1991 for Austin Energy, where he served as Director of Corporate Improvement Services in the Office of the General Manager until his untimely passing.











Dr. Bibby was admired as a public servant and a leader in the community. He was a Life Member of The University of Texas Exes and was honored as the Outstanding African American Alumnus by the Ex-Students Association of The University of Texas. Clarence was a proud member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity; he was a founding member of Kappa Eta Chapter at Seton Hall University. Dr. Bibby was a charter member of the Texas Alliance of Black School Educators.

While he was passionate about education and intellectual pursuit, Clarence's greatest joy was his children, Julian and Jordan. Clarence was a regular and active volunteer at Julian and Jordan's school "St. Francis School". A tribute to Clarence's parenting abilities is that he was featured and interviewed on "The Dad Show" in October. The show is nationally syndicated. As a result of Clarence's Dad Show interview, he developed a 5-week curriculum on fatherhood.


Clarence proudly celebrated being a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity and maintained a life-long friendship with his line brothers from New Jersey. Having adopted Texas as home after marriage and receiving his doctorate, Clarence developed a love of barbecue and southern cuisine. He was a long-standing member of David Chapel Baptist Church where he gave leadership to the church's strategic planning process and served in other leadership roles.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Clarence and Edna Bibby.

Dr. Bibby is survived by his wife Michele Bibby; his son Julian Bibby and his daughter Jordan Bibby; sister Linda Bibby; brother Shawn Bibby of Atlantic City, New Jersey; mother-in-law Rae Martel of Alexandria, Virginia and a host of other relatives and friends.

In the fell clutch of circumstance I have not winced nor cried aloud. Under the bludgeonings of chance My head is bloody, but unbowed.


Beyond this place of wrath and tears Looms but the Horror of the shade, And yet the menace of the years Finds, and shall find, me unafraid.


It matters not how strait the gate, How charged with punishments the scroll. I am the master of my fate: I am the captain of my soul.
